



AL DODSON

Born and raised in New Orleans, Al was first exposed to horseshoes by his grandparents at family picnics and at Company Tournaments played at Audobon Park. He attended the University of Southwestern Louisiana in Lafayette, where he met his wife to be, Linda, and where he and a fraternity brother claimed the Campus Doubles Horseshoe Title in 1966. He and Linda located in Morgan City in 1968, where Al began his career as a Marine Engineer at a local shipyard, raising two daughters, and where they continue to reside today.

An avid bowler throughout his life, Al continued to play horseshoes only at family gatherings and Company picnics, until 1994, when he was approached to attend a horseshoe meeting and join a new horseshoe club in the area, the LA 70 Ringers. Al was immediately hooked, became sanctioned and competed in his first sanctioned Tournament in Harahan the very next week. That same year, Al won the Class “D” State Doubles Title with partner Charlie Bergeron, and finished third in Class “F” in the State Singles Tournament.

Al instantly became a very involved member of the LA 70 Ringers, as that 12 man group began construction of the first ten courts at Kemper Williams Park in Patterson, which became a regular venue for sanction Tournaments, and hosted their first State Tournament in 1995.

In 1996, Al was elected 1st Vice-President of the LSHPA, a position he held until 2004. As 1st Vice President, Al was tasked to form and inaugurate a Hall of Fame program for the LSHPA. The first members of that prestigious group were inducted the very next year. In 2004, Al was elected President of the LSHPA, and held that position until 2010. He was elected Secretary/Treasurer of LSHPA in 2011.

Al was instrumental in the formation of the Bayou Horseshoe Pitchers Association in 1997, which combined the LA 70 Ringers and the Atchafalaya Horseshoe Club into one organization. Al was elected President of the new Association, a position he held until 2006.

He was elected Secretary/Treasurer of that Club in 2008, a position he still holds today.
